EIGHTH MINUTE OF THE ENVIRONMENT COURT (7 February 2017)

[1] This minute confirms the agenda for the first prehearing conference in these proceedings to be held at 10.00am on 9 February 2017:

- (a) entry of attendances and representation for WIAL and consent authorities;
- (b) discussion as to possible joint representation of persons and bodies having similar interests;
- (c) preliminary issues raised by the parties;
- (d) identification of issues and witnesses and their expertise of from each party who will be providing evidence at the hearing;
- (e) discussion of proposed timetable including any suggestion about the time and place of the hearing, the procedure to be followed at the hearing and the likely duration of hearing;
- (f) discussion and confirmation regarding filing and serving of documents/evidence;
- (g) discussion regarding exhibits, agreed file of documents and maps/planning documents, common landscape exhibits;
- (h) discussion on applications made to the Environmental Legal Assistance fund;
- (i) waiver applications made by Richard Nimmo, Breaker Bay and Moa Point Progressive Association and Susan Haniel.



- (j) any other relevant matters on which arrangements should be made or directions given to ensure the fair, orderly and efficient hearing of the proceedings.

[2] As advised previously, because of the potential number of attendees the Court will not take individual appearances at the commencement of the conference. Two attendance registers will be available at the entrance to the Court from 9.30am and all parties who wish to formally enter an appearance will be required to sign the register.

[3] The conference will commence with the Court taking appearances from WIAL and the consent authorities who may address the Court on the various agenda items. After that process other parties wishing to address the Court will be given the opportunity to identify themselves and speak to such matters as they wish. The presiding judge will determine the format of discussion which may proceed on an issue by issue basis.

[4] Parties who wish to raise for discussion any issue not specifically included on the agenda (item 1(j) above) are invited to submit memoranda on those issues for consideration by the Court and other parties prior to the prehearing conference.
